

## TOWN WARRANT.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

FRANKLIN, SS.

To either of the Constables of the Town of Montague in said County of Franklin.

GREETING.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are hereby directed to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified to vote in elections and town affairs, to meet at the polling places designated and appointed as polling places in their respective precincts, in said Town of Montague, to wit: Turners Falls precinct, Hibernian Hall in Turners Falls; Millers Falls precinct at Lock-up Hall, Millers Falls; Montague Centre precinct at Town Hall in Montague Centre: ON MONDAY, THE THIRD DAY OF MARCH, NEXT, at six o'clock in the forenoon, to bring in their votes on one ballot to the election officers for Town Clerk, Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, three Selectmen, one Assessor for three years, one Assessor for one year (to fill vacancy), three Overseers of Poor, three Fence Viewers, three School Committee for three years, three Trustees of Public Library for three years, three Auditors, one Board of Health for three years, one Tree Warden, twelve Constables, one License Commissioner for three years, also on the same ballot to vote "Yes" or "No" in answer to the following question: "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of Intoxicating Liquors in this Town?" The polls will be open at six o'clock in the forenoon and may be closed at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. 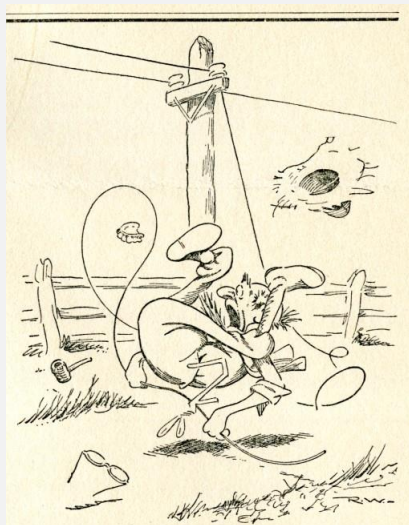
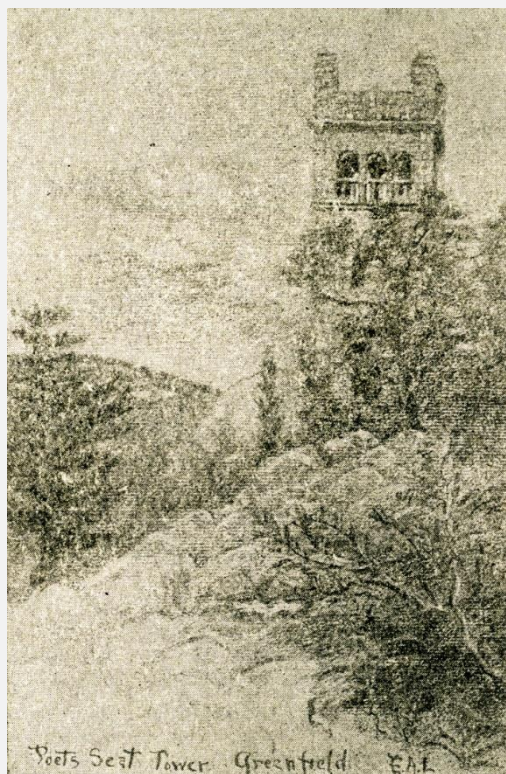
